






Regional Planning: The Three Plans

The Greenbelt Plan

- Internationally recognized as a leading example of a strong policy and legal framework
- World leader for adopting a 'systems' based approach to agricultural land and natural heritage features protection. Ensures protection for key features and the systems they support while preventing land fragmentation
- Designations give strong protection to the land in perpetuity. Providing this level of certainty gives municipalities and farmers confidence to plan and invest for the long term

Economic Impact

• \$9.1 billion GDP

- 161,000 jobs
 - the Greenbelt provides more jobs than the fish, forestry, mining, quarrying and oil & gas extraction sectors in Ontario combined
- Thriving Agriculture and Tourism
- Sustainable Rural Communities



Greenbelt Agriculture

- The Greenbelt is a catalyst for the local food movement: farmers' markets have doubled in a decade and there is a surge in public procurement – schools, hospitals, universities
- \$6.3 billion agriculture sector (GGH) is one of the biggest farming clusters in North America
- Natural and locational advantages: farms are 39% smaller but produce 23% more Gross Domestic Revenue than the average Ontario farm (farms in Niagara are significantly smaller – 78% are ≤ 25 acres)
- World renowned viticulture expanded from 6 to 59 vineyards since 2001 and 50% increase in VQA sales



The Value of Greenbelt Natural Heritage Systems

- Natural capital is valued at \$2.6 billion annually: regulation of air and water quality, the moderation of storm water, pollination, and supporting healthy soil formation.
- Value to the tax payer of \$3,500/ha
- In addition, Greenbelt land is equivalent to offsetting 27 million cars
- Home to 78 species dangerously close to extinction and contains many rare habitats
- Niagara is home to some of Canada's most diverse natural landscapes – wetlands, waterfalls, wildlife habitats
- Critical migratory routes for birds and mammals



Supporting Growth


- The Greenbelt Plan is on course to help save 87,000 ha of land from development by 2031 – mostly Class 1 farmland
- Based on municipal population and job projections, 81% of the land available for development will still be unused in 2031
- Increase densities and the land will last even longer
- RBC and Pembina study on housing costs found that low interest rates and demographic shifts are responsible for increasing house prices



- Submissions accepted to MAH and through the EBR
